A Little Update and Looking Ahead



It's been a busy and exciting few months for Little Green Steps WA and for the many early years educators who've been building their skills for embedding sustainability as a natural and valued part of young children's education and care.

We welcome Kylie Hosking back to the LGSWA team, in her Education Officer's role in the Cities of Cockburn and Armadale. We therefore say farewell to Anne Pettit, who has been filling in for Kylie over the last 6 months.

Anne's sustainability knowledge and passion for embedding sustainable actions

into early years has been absolutely invaluable over this time. Anne will continue with the program as a member of the LGSWA committee and we hope to continue to tap into Anne's expertise through some special future projects.

Celebrating NAIDOC Week this year (2nd to 9th July), the theme was 'Our Languages Matter' and the importance, resilience and richness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander languages was the focus.

A new initiative of special interest for the early years is the wonderful 'Lullabies' project, which celebrates and seeks to revive Nyungar language through the power of song.

As we move into August and September - Diilba season, the season of conception - you might like to explore some early years activities and notice what's happening around us in nature at this time of year.

Taking little green steps in Family Day Care



Toni Duff runs a small FDC service in Spearwood. Discovering that common types of nonrecyclable

packaging can be reused - for example for storing things and for children's activities - rather than thrown away has enabled Toni to reduce waste, and it's become part of how she shows children that we value all resources.

Toni is making much more use of her small garden beds and pots outdoors for children's learning activities, including involving children hands on in preparing garden beds, choosing the right plants for the season, caring for plants, and harvesting and preparing the produce to eat. It's great to see the increasingly 'alive' environment Toni is creating - with little resourcing.

We wish to acknowledge the traditional custodians of the land we work on. We acknowledge and respect their continuing culture and the contributions they make to the land and the life of Western Australia.





City of Cockburn Continues LGSWA Support

At a special City of Cockburn celebration event in May, Little Green Steps and a large number of community groups were awarded grants and donations in various categories for initiatives that benefit the local community and environment.

The City's support for Little Green Steps will continue for a further two years, to mid 2019, and with great appreciation we look forward to continuing to deliver and further develop our programs for early childhood educators across the region.

Exploring and Respecting Diversity in Padbury

Following Little Green Steps
WA's Cultural and Social Diversity
workshop at Padbury Education
and Child Care Centre, educators are making
changes to curriculums and practices. Educational
Leader Chantal Robson says:

This session has reminded our educators that culture is not necessarily about ethnicity, and that each family has their own culture. Educators have been inspired to reconnect with the families in their rooms, and to reflect on their own practices.

Educators in one of our rooms have decided to post a question of the week, which is displayed at the 'sign in' area. Families can write their answers on a post-it note. The first question was "Describe your family in one word'. Not only has this allowed educators to understand families better, it has built connections between families.

Another room is using critical literacy as a strategy to encourage children to think about culture and stereotypes. They have ensured that they have a wide selection of books which depict a variety of cultures. Educators ask children questions while they read the book to help children think about the similarities and differences between people.'

Making the most of organics

Nido Early School in Willetton and Goodstart Early Learning Mt Nasura have started composting and worm farming and they are involving children at every step. Food and garden 'waste' provides lots of opportunities for developing skills and learning about organics, reducing food waste and how living things, including microorganisms, insects and worms help to recycle energy and nutrients to benefit our gardens.

At Nido, each room has its own compost bucket and families can also take food scraps home for their chickens. Even the youngest children participate in composting, investigating their own worm farm, and planting seedlings.

Goodstart is starting to grow vegetables and

flowers in the garden and indoor plants in the Kindy room. The compost and worm liquid and castings will eventually help them all thrive. Children are also upcycling flowers from old bouquets etc. to make potpourri.



Plastic Free July

From its beginnings here in Perth several years ago, <u>Plastic Free July</u> (PFJ) has developed quickly into a world-wide community event, popular with all ages. Raising awareness and involving young children in reducing 'single use' plastics and other plastic waste gets them off to a great start in developing *reduce*, *reuse and recycle* habits for their whole lives.

With PFJ as the catalyst, Nido Early School focussed on ways to reduce plastic use and change behaviours at their centre and at home. This has included aiming to make it the norm to buy in bulk to reduce plastic and other packaging all year round.

The centre is reusing packaging that can't be

avoided for craft projects and seedling planting, using used certified compostable cups, plates and napkins that they compost on-site, and recycling 'soft and noisy' plastics through REDcycle.





EYES Conference

With its 'Let's talk about getting hands on in nature' theme, the LGSWA presentation at this years EYES Conference in May explored the notion of 'nature' and engaged educators with examples and discussion of ways to build how young children can 'connect to care' for their world. From hands on experiences in the garden - such as planting and caring for veggies and native plants, observing growth and development - to simply 'being in nature outdoors, anywhere', to touch tables, water and mud play and bush kinder, all have value in themselves that educators can add to by noticing opportunities to develop children's 'ecological' vocabulary and awareness about the connectedness of living things and the natural world.

Mundarda is Switched On



In June, Mundarda Child Care Centre in Seville Grove, supported by Little Green Steps WA, was recognised by Switch your thinking as a Switched On

School - as management and educators continue to explore and implement practices that support the Ecological Footprint and Social Handprint of sustainability in how the centre is run and in children's education and care.

At the celebration and plague presentation at the centre, by Switch your thinking and the City of Armadale, children joined in by preparing and serving afternoon tea, which was a lovely example of how Mundarda fosters children's sense of belonging and contributing to their community.

Love Nappies, Hate Waste

Every week many hundreds of disposable nappies (which should be placed in rubbish bins) arrive in recycling bins at the Southern Metropolitan Regional Council Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) and other council waste recovery facilities, where they contaminate recycling.

Inspired to tackle the problem and misconceptions around nappies, local environmental organisation Green Skills started a 'Love Nappies, Hate Waste' campaign in partnership with the City of Cockburn.

A Hello Baby stall and nappy workshops at library story-time and new parents groups introduced modern cloth nappies 'in the flesh' - not just on the internet - and demonstrated how to use and wash them, and reminded parents and others that disposable nappies can't be recycled and that they belong in the green bin.

LGSWA worked in partnership with Green Skills to share this message at our Reducing Waste Together workshops over the past few months, to show educators just how feasible and useful cloth nappies are as an alternative to disposables. Saving money is a major benefit.

So Cloth Nappies can be the solution....





Lady Gowrie Centre, Thebarton, in South Australia, has been using cloth nappies for well over 10 years. These days supplied pre-folded (and with inserts) by a linen service, the used cloth nappies are put in a 240 litre bin and collected weekly.

At the start barely 20% of families used cloth but now nearly 80% of parents of children attending the centre are happy to use the provided cloth nappies, while others supply their own single use ('disposable') nappies. The centre stopped purchasing single use nappies in 2013. Behaviour change happened not by lecturing people but because those using disposables would sometimes not provide enough and so their children went home in cloth and they became converted. Procedures are set up to make the system of cloth work!

PUMPKIN

Pumpkin is a colourful and versatile food. It stores well and can contribute to dishes both savoury and sweet, cooked and <u>raw</u>.

Pumpkins are rich in Vitamin A, C and E and important minerals - and great fun to grow, with their creeping vine habit that conceals them as they mature! Pepitas, pumpkin seeds from certain varieties, are a source of protein, vitamins, minerals and omega-3 fatty acids - a healthy snack for children.


Use your imagination! Pumpkins can also provide a basis for across-disciplines learning in language, maths, science, art etc. and the Environmental Footprint and Social Handprint of sustainability. For example: Biodiversity - exploring varieties (Butternut, Kent, Ironbark), seeing germinated seeds emerge as seedlings, bees pollinating flowers and perhaps other insects making the big leaves their home or food.


Energy - the plants using the sun's energy to grow, providing energy for us as food, and recycling energy when the spent plants and the skins and seeds are composted.

Cultural and Social Diversity - try other cultures' pumpkin recipes.

Economics and Built Environment - saving resources by growing our own food, generating income for garden projects from selling our produce.

'How many seeds in a pumpkin?' is about estimating numbers of seeds in different pumpkins before trying to find the answer. 'From Seed to Pumpkin' tells the story of growing a pumpkin patch.

Tasting familiar and unfamiliar fruits and vegetables <u>in season</u> in our area can help connect

young children to sustainability through food. It's interesting to compare what's in season with what can be planted at this time - and get growing.

PUMPKIN FRITTERS

As a soft fritter pumpkin appeals to young children because of its natural sweetness. This recipe is very simple and suitable for young children to help prepare. Obviously the cooking in a frypan would need to be monitored closely if you think this is a skill for children to learn at this time.

1 cup mashed cooked pumpkin (cool)

1 cup S/R flour

1 egg (add milk if needed)

Pinch salt

Optional 1 cup grated zucchini

Combine all of the above and cook on a frypan as fritters.








Welcome to Country

Greensburg came together to not just rebuild but to create a completely green town.




I'm Australian Too



textures to touch, and a scratch-and-sniff scent provide interactive surprises on every page as a cast of cavorting critters demonstrates opposites, actions, counting and more.


