Changes in weather, wind, temperatures and food availability dictate the seasons in the Noongar Calendar and the cooling autumn temperatures signify the beginning of the season of Djeran. In Noongar culture this was traditionally the time when people would perform courtship and marriage ceremonies as well as begin the preparations for the cooler temperatures to come such as sewing kangaroo cloaks (booka) for warmth and repairing Mia Mias. SWA Happenings

An LGS Case Study Creative Re-Use at its best





KidzBiz on Monash began its life on the old Hollywood Primary school site in Nedlands, when owner, Jenni Gatto, received permission to set up an early years' service for children 12 months to Kindy age. She inherited two large storage sheds filled to the brim with wood, pipes, an old water tank, a sink and 'antique' educational resources that hadn't seen the light of day for several years. The staff made it their mission to find a use for each and every abandoned item. Even a neglected piano has been resurrected, taking pride of place in the 3-year olds room and it now receives so much exploration that the lettered keys need to be re-drawn weekly!

Marnie Foley, the Educational Leader, explains that the centre is passionate about play-based learning, whole-child development and transitional education for the 60 plus children in their care. The many experiential learning opportunities on offer to the children attending KidzBiz, create agency in them to make change in real life.

This is being achieved through the sustainable use of existing resources and through the connections developed within the local communities around the centre.

Many indoor and outdoor educational spaces have been created through shared ideas, reused resources and contributions of the parents. children, educators and maintenance man at the centre. The Mud play kitchen is a work in progress -the sink has been installed into an old bench and Nick the handyman is working on a way to use gravity to feed water to it from an acquired water tank placed below the centre's roof eaves uphill. Extra water will re-supply the chooks at Cluckingham Palace housed under the same tree as the mud kitchen and worm farm. Meanwhile, the children's enthusiasm for this project is being stimulated on the day of my visit through a fun activity to make mud dough chocolates to fill recycled commercial chocolate trays.

With educator and parent support the children embrace and take action on environmental issues under a learning program called 'Real Life Super Heroes'. They have hand stamped and hand delivered letters to their local council representative on an issue close to their hearts: banning the Plastic Straw.

During the 'needles in strawberries' crisis, the educators, children and their families supported farmers by buying, eating and cooking plentiful strawberries, removing the stickers as they did so and then writing a letter to the Strawberry Board with all these stickers on it, to illustrate how they had taken part.

In the outdoor space, all parents sign a permission slip to allow children to attend excursions on any given day within 500 metres of the centre. Hence the children participate in lots of exploration and this flexibility allows opportunities to arise. With the cemetery, the community garden, Regis Aged Care, Nedlands Tennis Courts and an Aussie bush reserve within walking distance, every day often includes an outing with a real-life purpose.

Post the Reducing Waste workshop she attended at WMRC in October 2018, Marnie explained that she was excited by the endless opportunities to make a difference which the hands-on nature of the workshop had highlighted. The single most relevant information for Marnie was the definition of waste 'as a resource waiting for a use', which has been a guiding point for the Centre's purpose since its inception.

One of the most rewarding activities Marnie implemented post the workshop was to make Beeswax wraps for Christmas presents with both the parents and kids. This project highlighted the importance of making sustainable community connections as a group called the Nedlands Quilters both provided scraps of cotton material for this as well as taking part on the day to improve the process by providing a professional cutting table and tools.

It is Marnie's hope that Kidzbiz on Monash will continue to motivate the next generation of greener-than-green, waste-wise, sustainability super heroes!





Little Green Steps into the City of Gosnells

The LGSWA program was introduced to the City of Gosnells in 2019 with LGSWA Educator, Anne Pettit delivering two Day to Day Sustainability workshops to Gosnells early years at Mills Park in March and The Agonis Centre in April. The hands-on nature of demonstrating sustainable actions was well received by attendees and the support LGSWA received from Switch Your Thinking and Children's Services in the City of Gosnells bodes well for further workshops in the future. The Bush to Beach Trail through Whadjuk Noongar land is part of a 16.3km interconnected network of bush trails through the western suburbs. This particular trail is generally easy walking in small sections and shares knowledge of the Six Noongar Seasons along the way. You can also listen to dreaming stories shared by Neville Collard related to the Whadjuk trails network.

A is for Australian Animals by Frané Lessac

This book that was notable in the 2018 Children's Book Council of Australia's Eve Powall Award for Information books, explores the wonders of Australian animals and the diversity we see in our fauna.



Feathers, Fur and Spines...and other weird outfits by Sharon Dalgleish and Steve Morenos

Can you guess the Australian animal? Using close-up images of a unique feature of the animal, children are given the opportunity to guess the name of the animal. The book also has information on the animal and why that feature helps the animal to thrive.

The Future of Life: Biodiversity in the New Millennium - Kanopy Steaming (online video resource).

Access a range of video titles with your library card and the Kanopy streaming service. This video produced in 2002 for use in classrooms looks at how modern life is threatening biodiversity. Created by Edward O. Wilson it looks at how protecting biodiversity and our environment is necessary for the future of our way of life and the world's economy.



South Australian Native Bees by Susanne Richards

Did you know there are over 1500 species of native bees in Australia? This book that looks specifically at the variations of the bees in SA looks at the lifecycle, habitat, and why the state, and the world, needs different bees to thrive.



Wildflower Country by Stanley and Kaisa Breeden

For a more pictorial display of biodiversity you can explore this adult non-fiction book that showcases the biodiversity of the Southwestern region of Australia. With stunning pictures and lots of information for the parent/guardian reader this is a great book to inspire a trip out to view biodiversity in WA. Or, just to marvel at some of the many different flowers that exist in the state around us.

Cooking with Kids

There are at least five varieties of Apples in season now and they are often one of the most popular fruits for children to eat. When cooking apples, the choices decrease as they should keep their flavour and not turn to mush. From our seasonal options list, your best apple for the following recipe would be Granny Smiths or Golden Delicious*.

Apple Sponge

Ingredients:

1 large tin of Bakers Apples 500 gm OR Stew 5 Baking apples.

1/4 tsp cinnamon (optional)

3 eggs

½ cup caster sugar (use natural)

3/4 cup of S/R flour

1/4 cup of water

1 Tbsp of hot low fat milk

Method:

Place stewed or tinned apple into a pie dish and spread over the base and then sprinkle with cinnamon. Whisk eggs with sugar until thick and creamy. Fold in flour, water and hot milk. Pour over the fruit. Bake in a 180 degrees C oven for about 20 minutes until brown on top. YUM

How to celebrate these Sustainable Dates locally

National Heritage Festival - see <u>events in the City of</u>

Learn how to compost through attendance at the Shrinking waste & growing gardens presentation at the next South East Sustainable Schools meeting. Make compost in a bottle with your children and teach them how things decompose and make new living soil.
